That's when George went to work at Point Edward. And he was away for so long, he missed seeing her in the crib and everything. She was standing up when he came home. He had to stay away that first Christmas, too. And I remember he was going to come home, I believe it was her first birthday. George walked to Baddeck, game-legged--got home in daylight. He lay down on a bridge ' down there somewhere and slept for about a half hour.
