Actually, although Dun? can's wife was a shore-dweller, the poet himself had no claim to the title, since he lived in the Margaree valley quite near Donald's own home; but he argues the case as if he were a fish? erman and with apparent seriousness sweeps the protagonist's claims aside. He assures us that a visit to Donald's country will soon dispel any false impression we may have gained from Donald's song: Chi thu coille ghoirid, cham, Mu'n cuairt air sgall de chhreadh ann, 'S ma chaidh a thrcabhadh leis a' chrann, Chan eil am fonn 'g a innseadh dhuinn. You'll see stumpy, crooked trees surrounding a bald patch of clearing, and if it was ever turned with a plough, the appearance of the ground wouldn't tell you so. He belittles every attraction that the rival poet had adduced. Donald had praised the beautiful flowers of the rear; Duncan unceremoniously disposes of them: Nuair a thig an geamhradh duint', Ged 's math na flurain, crionaidh iad; 'S mor gu'm b' fhearr bhith 'n taic an t-sail' Far 'm faicte traigh us lionadh leat Na cumail sail air duilleach dluth Air feadh nan lub 's nan leanagan. When the winter closes in, the flowers will wither, although they're fine; I'd far rather be beside the sea and watch the ebb and flow than be staring at dense leafage among the groves and meadows. He enumerates the advantages of the fisherman's environment and concludes with the good-natured wish that Donald will still be willing to visit his adversary on the shore.
