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that this was during World War Two.) Oh yes, there were a number of farms he'd have to take care of, besides our own, you know.... They paid him a very small wage, but every dollar counted at that time. Therefore, he planted the hundred barrels of seed. And it was I who cut them, at different periods of time. I cut all those seeds for all those people. And I knew, let me tell you, I knew how to cut them. And I could go pretty fast at it. And I would take a potato, and a sharp knife. And I would cut around that seed deep enough to allow it to grow the root. And to be sure not to make it like a cookie-- you know what I mean. It would be no good that way. It had to have a bit of the po? tato with it. Because there's where the root came from this eye, from the potato. And every one of that seed--they call them seed--put in the drills, when they opened the drills with the horse. They put them that far apart. And cover them--put the =
