I doubt that his attitude towards sexual morality might have been too severe. I don't know about that. I have no proof of that, but that would be standard for the times. And when somebody said to me, "Well, what about the poor girls that had to go up to the front of the church if they were not married, and sit there across from the pulpit?" And I said, "Well, how much better than when they were whipped at the front door?" This was standard practice. This was a time of narrow-minded moralizing, and if that was in you, you were wicked and they would whip it out of you. Girls were chained. I mean, you don't have to go looking in the Highlands for somebody in the pulpit admonishing somebody for their sins. It was common practice. Whether it was male-dominated, or theology-dominated, or just guilt, I don't know. But compared to being admonished from the pulpit, or ostracized because you were pregnant, another answer to that is that I know of no unwedded mother who had to put a child into an orphanage in Waipu.
